English & Logical Reasoning Passage-I

It is now clear that as the United States of America and India embark on a relationship characterized by both as among the closest partnerships in the world, New Delhi will find itself engaged in geostrategic essays that did not feature high on its agenda until recently. While India's concerns about the Indo-Pacific have found expression through its participation in the Quadrilateral Security Dialogue, its involvement in the muddied waters of the South China Sea is also now increasing. Clearly, Washington expects this from New Delhi; as much has been made clear by America's top diplomat for East Asia, Daniel Kritenbrink. He told a Washington think-tank this week that he expects a greater US-India partnership over issues in the South China Sea, as a consequence of what is perceived as a "clear and upward" trend of Chinese coercion in an area which Beijing considers its bailiwick, to the extent of rejecting the findings of an international tribunal that ruled against it in a dispute with the Philippines. While India has participated in naval exercises in the area, this week it also decided to gift an active duty missile corvette, the INS Kirpan, to Vietnam. While India has gifted smaller boats to the Maldives and Mauritius, and a submarine to Myanmar, this is the first time it has gifted a warship to a country embroiled in a maritime dispute with China.

The Kirpan is fitted with medium- and close-range guns, chaff launchers and surface-to-surface missiles. Territorial disputes with Beijing in the South China Sea involve several countries, including Brunei, the Philippines, Indonesia, Malaysia, Taiwan and Vietnam. The nine-dash line, a set of line segments claimed by China, impacts these countries; but in addition, there are specific disputes relating to maritime boundaries, islands, reefs and shoals with several of them. In addition, China has disputes with Japan in the East Asia Sea. And, finally, there is the question (1) China's claim (2) Taiwan, and its determination (3) reclaim the territory. India, of course, has no claims in the area, but has partnered with Vietnam in several joint military exercises and sold weapons to the Philippines.

The gift of a missile corvette is clearly aimed at aiding efforts to counter what have been termed "unsafe manoeuvres" by Chinese vessels in Vietnam's exclusive economic zone. Mr. Kritenbrink was quite firm in asserting that India would play a greater role in the South China Sea as part of its Quad commitments. The message thus seems to be that India will join hands with other nations in its efforts to counter China, and not restrict itself to border and other disputes that have dogged ties for years. India is aware that China is sensitive to the presence of other navies in the South China Sea, but that has not stopped it from gifting the corvette "to assist a like-minded partner" in "enhancing capacity and capability." The stakes have been raised.

Passage-III

Once upon a time, in a city known as Crypton, everyone communicated through coded messages. The tradition began long ago when the town was established by Professor Codebreak, a brilliant linguist and cryptographer. He believed that using code for everyday communication would encourage the residents to keep their minds sharp. The city had several neighborhoods, each having a different code for communication. These included the Fibonacci Folks, the Alphabet Alternates, the Sequence Shifters, and the Number Nurturers. In Fibonacci Folks, people used Fibonacci series to encrypt messages. The letter 'A' was represented as 1, 'B' as 1, 'C' as 2, and so forth following the Fibonacci series pattern. If the letter was beyond 'Z', they used modular arithmetic to loop back to 'A'. In Alphabet Alternates, they used alternating code patterns for words. For instance, the first letter would be one step ahead in the alphabet, the second letter





would be one step back, the third one step ahead again, and so on. So, 'A' would become 'B', 'B' would become 'A', 'C' would become 'D', 'D' would become 'C', and so forth.

The Sequence Shifters were a bit different. They assigned each letter a number from 1 to 26, representing 'A' to 'Z', then shifted these numbers based on a defined sequence. For example, the sequence might be 3,2,1, meaning to shift the first letter of a word three places, the second two places, and the third one place, and then start the sequence over again for the fourth letter. Finally, the Number Nurturers represented each letter with its corresponding number in the alphabet but reversed the order of numbers in a word. So, 'CAB' would be written as '312' and then reversed to become '213'. Despite their different systems, the people of Crypton coexisted harmoniously, swapping coded messages and indulging in cryptic competitions. The city buzzed with the magic of cryptography, with its secrets safely locked in the minds of its people. As generations passed, the art of code-breaking became as natural to them as breathing, keeping their minds alert and alive. Professor Codebreak's idea had not only made Crypton unique but also sparked intellectual growth in its citizens. The town stood as a testament to the power of codes, showcasing a successful blend of communication, intellect, and community.

Passage-IV

Section 220 of Code of Criminal Procedure- If, in one series of acts so connected together as to form the same transaction, more offences than one are committed by the same person, he may be charged with, and tried at one trial for, every such offence.

The Supreme Court has ruled that whether two or more acts constitute the same transaction for the purpose of being tried together under Section 220 of the Code of Criminal Procedure is a question of fact. The court dismissed an appeal that challenged the order of the Uttarakhand High Court, which upheld the decision of the Court of Sessions Judge, Chamoli to discharge the accused in respect of a set of offences for want of jurisdiction. The Sessions Court discharged the accused because the offences alleged by the appellant did not met the requirement of Section 220 Cr.P.C. for being tried together. The Supreme Court held that the offences under Sections 376, and 380 IPC did not form 'one series of acts so connected together as to form the same transaction' for the purpose of trial together in terms of Section 220 CrPC. The complaint raised allegations of different offences, of different nature, and at different places of occurrence, but committed by the same person and against the same person. One set of allegations was that of the offence of rape in Delhi, and the other was of theft in the dwelling house which happens to be hers in her village in Chamoli. The Court referred to its previous judgment in Mohan Baitha And Ors. v. State of Bihar And Anr. and noted that there is no formula of universal application to determine when two or more acts could be considered to constitute the 'same transaction.' However, certain core elements like proximity of time, unity or proximity of place, continuity of action, and community of purpose or design can be considered.

Applying the same to the facts of the present case, the Court noted that the sexual offence took place at Delhi in February/March 2016, whereas the other offences took place around November 2016 at Chamoli. Therefore, they cannot be said to be proximate in time or place. Moreover, the alleged act of rape was completed in Delhi, as there was no allegation of continuance of such activity at Chamoli, and there was also no relation with the incident of theft in dwelling house of hers, of which the accused had no knowledge that the house belonged to her in Chamoli. Therefore, the Court held that the two sets of offences are not connected and do not form the same transaction.

A person who has once been tried by a Court of competent jurisdiction for an offence and convicted or acquitted of such offence shall, while such conviction or acquittal remains in force, not be liable to be tried again for the same offence. The accused cannot be subjected to retrial as the same would be in derogation of the principle of double jeopardy enshrined in the fundamental right of Article 20(2) of the Constitution of India and Section 300 of the Cr.P.C. but an appeal against such order can be made to the upper court.

Passage-VI

Social Insurance is one of the devices to prevent individual from falling to the death of poverty, misery and to help him in times of emergencies. Insurance involves the setting aside of some money in order to provide compensation against loss resulting from a particular emergency. Thus, social insurance is a co-operative device which aims at granting adequate benefits to the insured on the compulsory basis in time of unemployment, sickness and other emergencies. Sir William Beveridge has defined social insurance as giving in returns for contribution benefits upto substance level as of right and without means test so that individual may build freely upon it. Thus social insurance implies both that it is compulsory and that men stand together with their fellows.

This is based on the principles of compulsory mutual aid. The principal elements of social insurance are:

- i) Social insurance is financed by contributions which are normally shared between employers and workers, with perhaps, state participation in the form of a supplementary contribution or other subsidy from the general revenue.
- ii) Participation is compulsory with few exceptions.
- iii) Contributions are accumulated in special funds out of which benefits are paid.
- iv) Surplus funds not needed to pay, current benefits are invested to earn further income
- v) A person's right to benefit is secured by his contribution record without any test of need or means.
- vi) The contribution and benefit rates are often related to what the person is or has been earning.

Social assistance refers to the assistance rendered by the society to the poor and needy persons voluntarily without placing any obligation on them to make any contribution to be entitled to relief such as workmen's compensation, maternity benefit and old age pension etc. Thus, one may say that a social assistance scheme provides benefits for persons of small means granted as of right in amount sufficient to meet a minimum standard of need and financed from taxation.

Social assistance represents the unilateral obligations of the community towards its dependant group. It is provided by the society or the government to the poor and needy individual. The principal feature of social assistance are (1) the whole cost of the Programme is met by the State and local units of Government (2) benefits are paid as of





legal right in prescribed categories of need (3) in assessing need, a person's other income and resources are taken into account certain resources such as a reasonable level of personal savings are disregarded and (4) the benefit grant is designed to bring a person's total income upto a community determined maximum taking into account other factors such as family size and unavoidable fixed obligations such as rent grants are not related to applicant's previous earnings or customary standard of living. The difference between social insurance and social assistance are as follows:

Sol. Option (c) is correct. It is understood from the last paragraph that states, 'Mr. Kritenbrink was quite firm in asserting that India would play a greater role in the South China Sea as part of its Quad commitments.' Hence (c).

11. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct. Statement (i) is a Fact, as it can be proved whether 'he told 'or not. Statement (ii) is an Inference, as it can be identified from the phrase 'It is now clear '. Statement (iii) is a Judgement because it is the author's opinion that 'Mr. Kritenbrink was quite firm in asserting'. Hence (a).

12.

Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct. Statement (i) is an Inference, as it is a Judgement but based on the message. Statement (ii) is a Fact as it is verifiable, it can be proved whether and what India has gifted to which country. Statement (iii) is an Inference drawn on the base of the fact 'the gift of a missile corvette'. Why was the gift given, what its objective was, has been given in the rest of the sentence. Hence (b).

Sol. Option (c) is correct. The passage states that the head of the family, Mr. Henry, is a retired military officer and his discipline and order reflect in the family values, indicating the importance of discipline and order in the family experience.

Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that the family members have different careers (lawyer, professor, and entrepreneur) and it does not highlight any requirement for a specific career. Option (b) is also incorrect because the passage does not put emphasis on personal achievements, instead it talks about the diverse personalities and the unique roles each family member plays. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage states that while some family members like Daisy and Mrs. Barbara have vibrant personalities, others like Charlie have introverted personalities. This suggests that having a vibrant personality is not essential to the experience of being a family member in this household. Hence (c).

14. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct. The words "vibrant" and "introverted" are not synonyms; instead, they represent contrasting characteristics. While "vibrant" describes a lively and energetic personality, "introverted" refers to a quieter, more reserved nature. The character difference between Charlie and Daisy in the passage illustrates this contrast. Option (a) is incorrect because the words "teeming" and "full" are synonyms, both denoting something filled or abundant. Option (b) is also incorrect because "renowned" and "respected" are synonyms, both implying a sense of admiration or regard. Option (d) is incorrect because "keen" and "eager" are synonyms, both expressing a high degree of enthusiasm or interest. Hence (c).

15. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct. The passage states that Mr. Henry's discipline and order reflect in the family values and these traits have an effect on the family's life, hence they played





an important role in shaping the family dynamics. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage does not indicate that Mr. Henry's discipline and order were used to control the family. Rather, they were values he embodied and had an influence on the family. Option (b) is incorrect as well because there's no mention in the passage that these traits caused any conflict within the family. Option (d) is incorrect because the author does talk about the discipline and order of Mr. Henry, indicating they are relevant to the author's portrayal of the family. Hence (c).

16. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because in the context of the passage, 'convoluted' is used to describe the large family with its diverse characters and rich dynamics, indicating a complex or intricate family structure. Option (a) is incorrect because 'convoluted' does not mean something that is simple and straightforward, rather it denotes complexity. Option (c) is incorrect because the term 'convoluted' does not inherently carry a negative or harmful connotation, and the passage does not portray the family's complexity as a negative aspect. Option (d) is incorrect because 'convoluted' does not mean enthusiastic or vibrant, but refers to something being complex or intricate. Hence (b).

17. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct because the passage clearly states that Mrs. Isabelle is known for her delicious cooking and is actively involved in family affairs, thus contributing significantly to the family dynamics. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage does not indicate that Mrs. Isabelle was the primary decision-maker in the family. Option (b) is also incorrect because, contrary to being distant, Mrs. Isabelle is described as actively involved in the family affairs. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage does not mention Mrs. Isabelle having a strict and disciplined approach to family matters; instead, this trait is associated with Mr. Henry. Hence (c).

SECTION B - LOGICAL REASONING

18. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because the passage states that George is the son of Mr. Edward and Ms. Fiona. Mr. Edward is the brother of Mrs. Barbara, who is Charlie's mother. This makes George and Charlie first cousins. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that George is the son of Mr. Edward and Ms. Fiona while Charlie is the son of Mr. Albert and Mrs. Barbara. George and Charlie have different parents, which rules out the possibility of them being brothers. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage states that George is the son of Mr. Edward and Ms. Fiona, while Charlie is the son of Mrs. Barbara, Mr. Edward's sister. The generational gap between George and Charlie is not there; they belong to the same generation, which negates the possibility of an uncle-nephew relationship. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage states that George is the son of Mr. Edward and Ms. Fiona. Charlie, on the other hand, is the son of Mr. Albert and Mrs. Barbara. Since George and Charlie are of the same generation, they cannot be in an uncle-nephew relationship. George would be a nephew to Charlie if Charlie were a sibling of one of George's parents, but that is not the case here. Hence (b).

19. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct because the passage states that Ms. Fiona is married to Mr. Edward, who is the brother of Mrs. Barbara, and Mrs. Barbara is married to Mr. Albert. Hence, Mr. Albert is the brother-in-law of Ms. Fiona. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage states that Charlie is the son of Mr. Albert and Mrs. Barbara. This makes





Charlie the nephew of Ms. Fiona, not the brother-in-law. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage states that Mr. Edward is the husband of Ms. Fiona. A person cannot be a brother-in-law to their own spouse. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage states that Mr. Henry is the father of Mrs. Barbara and Mr. Edward. Therefore, he is Fiona's father-in-law, not brother-in-law. Hence (a).

20. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct because the passage states that Daisy is the daughter of Mr. Albert and Mrs. Barbara, and Mrs. Barbara is the daughter of Mrs. Isabelle. Hence, Daisy is the granddaughter of Mrs. Isabelle. Option B is incorrect because the passage states that Daisy is the daughter of Mrs. Barbara and Mr. Albert, not Mrs. Isabelle. Therefore, Mrs. Isabelle cannot be Daisy's mother. Option C is incorrect because the passage states that Daisy is the daughter of Mrs. Barbara and Mr. Albert, and Mrs. Barbara is the daughter of Mrs. Isabelle. This makes Daisy the granddaughter of Mrs. Isabelle, not her niece. Option D is incorrect because the passage states that Daisy is the daughter of Mrs. Barbara and Mr. Albert. Mrs. Isabelle is Mrs. Barbara's mother, which places Daisy and Mrs. Isabelle in different generations, hence they cannot be sisters. Hence (a).

21. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct because the passage states that George is the son of Mr. Edward and Ms. Fiona, hence Ms. Fiona is the mother of George. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that Mrs. Barbara is the mother of Charlie and Daisy, not George. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage states that Mrs. Isabelle is the mother of Mrs. Barbara and Mr. Edward. She is the grandmother of George, not his mother. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage states that Daisy is the daughter of Mr. Albert and Mrs. Barbara. Given the generational difference, Daisy cannot be the mother of George. Hence (c).



Passage-III

Once upon a time, in a city known as Crypton, everyone communicated through coded messages. The tradition began long ago when the town was established by Professor Codebreak, a brilliant linguist and cryptographer. He believed that using code for everyday communication would encourage the residents to keep their minds sharp. The city had several neighborhoods, each having a different code for communication. These included the Fibonacci Folks, the Alphabet Alternates, the Sequence Shifters, and the Number Nurturers. In Fibonacci Folks, people used Fibonacci series to encrypt messages. The letter 'A' was represented as 1, 'B' as 1, 'C' as 2, and so forth following the Fibonacci series pattern. If the letter was beyond 'Z', they used modular arithmetic to loop back to 'A'. In Alphabet Alternates, they used alternating code patterns for words. For instance, the first letter would be one step ahead in the alphabet, the second letter would be one step back, the third one step ahead again, and so on. So, 'A' would become 'B', 'B' would become 'A', 'C' would become 'D', 'D' would become 'C', and so forth.

The Sequence Shifters were a bit different. They assigned each letter a number from 1 to 26, representing 'A' to 'Z', then shifted these numbers based on a defined sequence. For example, the sequence might be 3,2,1, meaning to shift the first letter of a word three places, the second two places, and the third one place, and then start the sequence over again for the fourth letter. Finally, the Number Nurturers represented each letter with its





corresponding number in the alphabet but reversed the order of numbers in a word. So, 'CAB' would be written as '312' and then reversed to become '213'. Despite their different systems, the people of Crypton coexisted harmoniously, swapping coded messages and indulging in cryptic competitions. The city buzzed with the magic of cryptography, with its secrets safely locked in the minds of its people. As generations passed, the art of code-breaking became as natural to them as breathing, keeping their minds alert and alive. Professor Codebreak's idea had not only made Crypton unique but also sparked intellectual growth in its citizens. The town stood as a testament to the power of codes, showcasing a successful blend of communication, intellect, and community.

SECTION A - ENGLISH

25. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct because the last sentence in the passage states that "The town stood as a testament to the power of codes, showcasing a successful blend of communication, intellect, and community." This best aligns with the idea that Crypton showcased the importance of coding in communication and the intellectual development of its citizens. Option (b) is incorrect because, while the passage talks about the proficiency of Crypton's citizens in code-breaking, it does not suggest that Crypton was a hub for codebreakers worldwide. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage does not imply that Crypton was secretive or insular. Rather, it suggests that its unique communication system was used to stimulate intellectual growth among its citizens. Option (d) is incorrect because, although Professor Codebreak's vision played a significant role in the establishment of Crypton, the town is portrayed as a testament to the power of codes, rather than an embodiment of the Professor's eccentricity.

26. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because, in the passage, it's described that Sequence Shifters use a defined sequence shift, similar to how Fibonacci Folks use the Fibonacci series as their encoding method. Option (a) is incorrect because, while Alphabet Alternates does involve the alphabet, it doesn't strictly follow the alphabetical order. Instead, it uses an alternating code pattern for words. Option (c) is incorrect because, while the Number Nurturers do deal with numbers, they specifically reverse the order of numbers in a word rather than just using numbers in general. Option (d) is incorrect because, while Professor Codebreak is a significant figure in Crypton, he isn't tied to a specific coding method like the Fibonacci Folks are with the Fibonacci series.

27. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct because the phrase "The city buzzed with the magic of cryptography" is a metaphor. It doesn't literally mean that the city was buzzing, or that cryptography is magical. Instead, it is using vivid and imaginative language to convey the excitement and intrigue of the city's unique communication systems. Option (b) is incorrect because it's a metaphorical statement, but it doesn't use a comparison between two unlike things, which is a characteristic of a metaphor. It's more of a symbolic representation. Option (c) is incorrect because it's a simile, not a metaphor. It directly compares the proficiency of Crypton's citizens in code-breaking to the natural process of breathing using "as". Option (d) is incorrect because it's a factual statement about the different coding systems used in different neighborhoods of Crypton, not a metaphor.





Sol. Option (b) is correct because the passage implies that the coded communication system of Crypton was not just about exchanging messages but also about stimulating the intellect and creating a sense of community among the residents. This matches the idea that the communication system was a successful mix of intellectual stimulation, effective communication, and community bonding. Option (a) is incorrect because, while the passage does present Crypton positively, it does not make any claims about it being a 'utopian society.' Option (c) is incorrect because, although the codes used in Crypton might be difficult for outsiders to comprehend, the passage does not portray Crypton as a 'mysterious place.' Option (d) is incorrect because the passage does not mention anything about Crypton being famous for its libraries or educational institutions. The focus is on the unique communication system and its effects on the community, not on traditional educational resources.

29. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because the passage states that the codes were a functional part of daily communication in Crypton, intended to encourage the residents to keep their minds sharp. This contradicts the notion that the communication system was designed to exclude outsiders. Option (a) is incorrect because, while the communication system in Crypton was complex, the passage does not suggest that it was designed to deter foreign spies. Option (c) is incorrect because, while the codes are a part of Crypton's cultural heritage, the passage describes them as a functional part of daily communication, not as having no practical use. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage does not state that residents were forbidden to communicate in any language other than their codes. The focus is on the unique communication system and its effects on the community, not on language restrictions.

SECTION B - LOGICAL REASONING

30. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct because the passage states that "As generations passed, the art of code-breaking became as natural to them as breathing." This indicates that the residents of Crypton had a natural proficiency for code-breaking due to their consistent engagement with complex communication systems. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage does not state that residents were discouraged from using simple languages. Instead, it describes various complex coding systems used for communication. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage does not provide any information about Crypton's literacy rate in comparison to other cities. Option (d) is incorrect because, while the codes used for communication in Crypton might be difficult for outsiders to understand, the passage does not suggest that they were designed with the intention to exclude outsiders. The main purpose of these codes was to stimulate intellectual growth among the residents.

31. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct because the passage states that Professor Codebreak, the founder of Crypton, believed that using code for everyday communication would encourage the residents to keep their minds sharp. This indicates that the coded communication system was designed with the intention to keep citizens mentally active. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that the people of Crypton coexisted harmoniously and were proficient at code-breaking. It does not imply that the communication system was confusing or led to misunderstandings. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage implies that the codes were a functional part of daily





communication in Crypton. It doesn't suggest that this system was ineffective. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage does not explicitly state that the language was secretive or that outsiders couldn't comprehend it. The primary purpose of the codes, as per the passage, was to stimulate intellectual growth among the citizens, not to exclude outsiders.

32. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct because the Alphabet Alternates neighborhood uses an alternating code pattern. Here, the first letter would be one step ahead in the alphabet, the second letter would be one step back, the third one step ahead again, and so on. So, 'B' would become 'A', 'E' would become 'F', 'A' would become 'B', and 'M' would become 'N'. Therefore, "BEAM" would be interpreted as "AFBN". Hence, (a).

33. Ans. d

Sol. Option (d) is correct because the Number Nurturers neighborhood represents each letter with its corresponding number in the alphabet but reverses the order of numbers in a word. So, the number '13524' should be reversed first to get '42531'. These numbers correspond to the 4th ('D'), 2nd ('B'), 5th ('E'), 3rd ('C'), and 1st ('A') letters in the alphabet. Therefore, "13524" would be interpreted as "DBECA". Hence (d).

34. Ans. a



Section 220 of Code of Criminal Procedure- If, in one series of acts so connected together as to form the same transaction, more offences than one are committed by the same person, he may be charged with, and tried at one trial for, every such offence.

The Supreme Court has ruled that whether two or more acts constitute the same transaction for the purpose of being tried together under Section 220 of the Code of Criminal Procedure is a question of fact. The court dismissed an appeal that challenged the order of the Uttarakhand High Court, which upheld the decision of the Court of Sessions Judge, Chamoli to discharge the accused in respect of a set of offences for want of jurisdiction. The Sessions Court discharged the accused because the offences alleged by the appellant did not met the requirement of Section 220 Cr.P.C. for being tried together. The Supreme Court held that the offences under Sections 376, and 380 IPC did not form 'one series of acts so connected together as to form the same transaction' for the purpose of trial together in terms of Section 220 CrPC. The complaint raised allegations of different offences, of different nature, and at different places of occurrence, but committed by the same person and against the same person. One set of allegations was that of the offence of rape in Delhi, and the other was of theft in the dwelling house which happens to be hers in her village in Chamoli. The Court referred to its previous judgment in Mohan Baitha And Ors. v. State of Bihar And Anr. and noted that there is no formula of universal application to determine when two or more acts could be considered to constitute the 'same transaction.' However, certain core elements like proximity of time, unity or proximity of place, continuity of action, and community of purpose or design can be considered.

Applying the same to the facts of the present case, the Court noted that the sexual offence took place at Delhi in February/March 2016, whereas the other offences took place around November 2016 at Chamoli. Therefore, they cannot be said to be proximate in time or place. Moreover, the alleged act of rape was completed in Delhi, as there was no allegation of continuance of such activity at Chamoli, and there was also no relation with the incident of theft in dwelling house of hers, of which the accused had no knowledge that the house belonged to her in Chamoli. Therefore, the Court held that the two sets of offences are not connected and do not form the same transaction.

A person who has once been tried by a Court of competent jurisdiction for an offence and convicted or acquitted of such offence shall, while such conviction or acquittal remains in force, not be liable to be tried again for the same offence. The accused cannot be subjected to retrial as the same would be in derogation of the principle of double jeopardy enshrined in the fundamental right of Article 20(2) of the Constitution of India and Section 300 of the Cr.P.C. but an appeal against such order can be made to the upper court.

Sol: Option (d) is correct. In the legal terminology the word 'enshrined' when used for a right, principal or a law, it means that the principle is included, protected and respected





in the constitution. The rest of the words have different contextual uses. Option (a) can be used as 'preserving the food'; Consecration of a place 'it means to make holy and sacred; 'cherished can be used with memories'. Hence (d)

39. Ans. c

Sol: Option (c) is correct. It is understood from the first paragraph last few lines, 'there is no formula of universal application to determine when two or more acts could be considered to constitute the 'same transaction.' However, certain core elements like proximity of time, unity or proximity of place, continuity of action, and community of purpose or design can be considered.' Hence (c)

40. Ans. b

Sol: Option (b) is correct. This is according to what is discussed in the passage. Option (a) is incorrect as it gives two contradictory statements. Options (a), (c) and (d) are distorted ones. Hence (b).

41. Ans. c

Sol: Option (c) is correct. It can be understood from the construction of the passage. The first paragraph states very clearly the point of the author the Section 220 of Code of Criminal Procedure' which is then followed by the example of a case in the Uttarakhand High Court. Hence (c).

Sol: Option (b) is correct. It is contradicted in the last paragraph. The rest of the three options are correct as they are stated in the last paragraph.' A person who has once been tried by a Court of competent jurisdiction for an offence and convicted or acquitted of such offence shall, while such conviction or acquittal remains in force, not be liable to be tried again for the same offence. The accused cannot be subjected to retrial as the same would be in derogation of the principle of double jeopardy enshrined in the fundamental right'. Hence (c).

44. Ans. b

Sol: Option (b) is correct because the passage states that the offences in the case mentioned took place at different times and places (Delhi and Chamoli) and were not considered to be part of the same transaction. In the hypothetical situation, Vidhan's offences also took place at different times and places (Mumbai and Chennai). Further there is no continuity of action or purpose so they cannot be tried together under Section 220 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. Option (a) is incorrect because, although both offences were committed by the same person and against the same person, the





passage states that there is no formula of universal application to determine when two or more acts could be considered to constitute the 'same transaction.' Certain core elements like proximity of time, unity or proximity of place, continuity of action, and community of purpose or design need to be considered. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage does not indicate that the similarity of offences is a determining factor for being tried together under Section 220 of the Code of Criminal Procedure. Option (d) is incorrect because, the continuity of action is one of the elements mentioned in the passage but here there is no continuity of action. Hence (b)

45. Ans. d

Sol: Option (d) is correct because the passage states that a person who has once been tried by a Court of competent jurisdiction for an offence and convicted or acquitted of such offence shall, while such conviction or acquittal remains in force, not be liable to be tried again for the same offence. The accused cannot be subjected to retrial as the same would be in derogation of the principle of double jeopardy enshrined in Article 20(2) of the Constitution of India and Section 300 of the Cr.P.C. Option (a) is incorrect because the fact that the offences took place in different cities is not the determining factor in assessing whether the principle of double jeopardy applies. Option (b) is incorrect because the nature of the offences is not the determining factor in assessing whether the principle of double jeopardy applies. Option (c) is incorrect because it cannot be determined by accused, whether he has committed any or not. It has to be decided by the competent court. Hence (c)

46. Ans. b

Sol: Option (b) is correct because the passage states that certain core elements, such as proximity of time, unity or proximity of place, continuity of action, and community of purpose or design, can be considered in determining whether two or more acts constitute the 'same transaction.' In this situation, there is a proximity of time and continuity of actions by Vidhan against Vidhi as Vidhan allegedly stole Vidhi's purse to pressure her into meeting him where the assault took place. Option (a) is incorrect because simply having the same person as the perpetrator and the victim is not conclusive to determine whether the offences constitute the 'same transaction.' Option (b) provides a more inclusive option.

47. Ans. d

Sol: Option (d) is correct because the passage states that retrial would be in derogation of the principle of double jeopardy enshrined in Article 20(2) of the Constitution of India and Section 300 of the Cr.P.C. Since Vinil has already been acquitted for the fraud offence against Vidhan in Delhi, he cannot be tried again for the same offence in Hyderabad. Option (a) is incorrect because the fact that accused has committed theft earlier cannot give the right to court trying subsequent charge of theft to include the earlier case of theft. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage nowhere provides that a court's efficiency to try the case depends on the fact that it has all similar cases against the accused. Option (c) is incorrect because the timing or place of the offences are not the determining factor in assessing the applicability of the principle of double jeopardy. Hence (d).

48. Ans. d

Sol. Option (d) is correct. All are true statements. (I) and (II) are true because the passage provides that a person who has once been tried by a Court of competent





jurisdiction for an offence and convicted or acquitted of such offence shall, while such conviction or acquittal remains in force, not be liable to be tried again for the same offence. Therefore after either conviction or acquittal, the accused cannot be again tried but against such order an appeal can be dne. (III) is true because in Mohan Baitha And Ors. v. State of Bihar And Anr. Court noted that there is no formula of universal application to determine when two or more acts could be considered to constitute the 'same transaction.' However, certain core elements like proximity of time, unity or proximity of place, continuity of action, and community of purpose or design can be considered. It is not necessary that all should be present to constitute same transaction. If some of them can sufficiently establish the same transaction then the accused can be tried for the offences in that transaction together. (IV) is true because passage provides that the accused cannot be subjected to retrial as the same would be in derogation of the principle of double jeopardy enshrined in Article 20(2) of the Constitution of India and Section 300 of the Cr.P.C. Article 20(2) is the fundamental right. Further in laymen's understanding also, it should be a human right to not be subjected to trial twice for one offence. Hence (d).

Passage-V

Indeed, a player's ability to assess their opponent's strategy, exploit weaknesses, and adapt to changing conditions is as critical to winning a match as their physical prowess. Consider the grueling five-set contest at Wimbledon 2023, where renowned veterans Adam Fletcher and Gustavo Mireles, known for their distinct playing styles, faced off. Fletcher, the top seed, was an aggressive player. His power serves frequently exceeded 130 mph, and his topspin-heavy groundstrokes often pushed opponents deep behind the baseline. Off the court, he had an unrivaled training regimen to maintain his strength, allowing him to maintain these offensive tactics throughout long matches. On the other hand, Mireles was famous for his defensive strategies. He was a counter-puncher, capable of chasing down any ball, returning it with accuracy and poise. Although he couldn't match Fletcher's raw power, Mireles possessed superior agility and stamina, which allowed him to outlast opponents during long rallies. His patience and intelligence on the court often frustrated opponents into making errors. During their encounter, Fletcher and Mireles exhibited these characteristic traits. Fletcher aimed to end points quickly, using his power serves and groundstrokes to control the game. Mireles, on the other hand, focused on keeping the ball in play and moving Fletcher around the court, hoping to wear him down and force him into errors. The match extended into a fifth set, each player adjusting their strategies as the game progressed. Fletcher aimed to preserve his energy, placing greater emphasis on his first serve and seeking opportunities to approach the net for easy volleys. Mireles, recognizing this, started to use more defensive lobs and passing shots to keep Fletcher off the net. Throughout the match, both players exhibited mental resilience and physical endurance, adjusting to the fluctuating momentum of the game. Fletcher's power and Mireles's defense resulted in a thrilling contest that will be remembered as one of the great clashes of tennis history. The match showcased the strategic depth of tennis, where the complex interplay of physical strength, tactical thinking, and adaptability determined the outcome. It underlined the fact that tennis, like many sports, is not just about athletic prowess but also about strategic intelligence, resilience, and the ability to adapt.

SECTION A - ENGLISH





Sol. Option (b) is correct. The passage provides a detailed account of a tennis match between Adam Fletcher and Gustavo Mireles. It includes a thorough analysis of both players' styles, strategies, and tactics during the game, which classifies the text as a "Game Analysis." Option (a) is incorrect because the passage is not a personal story told by the author from his/her own experience. Instead, it is a third-person recount of a tennis match. Option (c) is incorrect because, although the passage does recount a specific event, it does not give a broad historical context or reflection. Instead, it focuses on the tactics and strategies of a single match. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage is not a work of speculative fiction based on futuristic or scientific concepts. Instead, it is a factual account of a tennis match. Hence (b).

50. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct. The passage directly mentions that Fletcher is an aggressive player. His tactics involve powerful serves and topspin-heavy groundstrokes, which are offensive strategies intended to control the game and keep his opponents on the defensive. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that Fletcher's power serves and topspin-heavy groundstrokes often forced his opponents to move deep behind the baseline, implying an aggressive rather than defensive style. Option (b) is incorrect because, while balance between offense and defense is essential in tennis, the passage primarily highlights Fletcher's aggressive, offensive style, with no mention of his defensive skills. Option (d) is incorrect because Fletcher aims to end points quickly, as mentioned in the passage, which contradicts the idea of him relying on long rallies to exhaust his opponents. His aggressive playstyle is designed to keep control of the game, not extend it unnecessarily. Hence (c).

51. Ans. d

Sol. Option (d) is correct. The passage clearly describes Mireles's playstyle as defensive. He is known for his ability to chase down any ball and return it with precision, often causing frustration in his opponents and inducing them into making errors. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage does not mention Mireles using power serves to control the game. His playstyle is described as defensive rather than offensive. Option (b) is incorrect because, contrary to this option, the passage describes Mireles as a player who keeps the ball in play and moves his opponent around the court. He does not seek to end points quickly with aggressive groundstrokes. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage describes Mireles as a defensive player rather than an aggressive one. He doesn't push opponents behind the baseline; instead, he uses his superior agility and stamina to chase down any ball and return it with accuracy. Hence (d).

52. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct. In the context of the passage, "interplay" refers to the dynamic exchange or interaction between physical strength, tactical thinking, and adaptability in tennis, thus best aligning with the meaning of "interchange". Option (a) is incorrect because the term "interplay" does not denote a conflict. Instead, it refers to the interaction between different elements. Option (b) is incorrect because, while "interplay" can involve elements working together, it does not necessarily imply cooperation or agreement. Option (d) is incorrect because "interplay" does not refer to an intrusion or disturbance. It signifies an interaction, not an interruption or invasion. Hence (c).





Sol. Option (b) is correct. The passage mentions that Mireles started using more defensive lobs and passing shots to keep Fletcher off the net. This demonstrates a strategic adjustment in response to Fletcher's tactics, implying adaptability and strategic thinking on Mireles's part. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that Mireles was known for his defensive strategies and had superior agility and stamina, which allowed him to compete against Fletcher's aggressive play style. His tactics were different, not inferior. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage doesn't suggest that Mireles was losing or desperately trying new tactics. Instead, it highlights Mireles's adaptability in changing his strategies based on his opponent's play style. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage describes Mireles as a skilled player with superior agility and stamina. His use of defensive lobs and passing shots was not due to a lack of skill, but a strategic decision in response to Fletcher's game plan. Hence (b).

SECTION B - LOGICAL REASONING

54. Ans. d

Sol. Option (d) is correct. The passage does not mention anywhere that Fletcher exploited Mireles's lack of power in his serves. Fletcher's tactics revolved around his own power and aggressiveness, not exploiting his opponent's weaknesses. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that "Fletcher aimed to end points quickly, using his power serves and groundstrokes to control the game." This indicates that he did rely on his power serves during the match. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage states that "Fletcher aimed to end points quickly, using his power serves and groundstrokes to control the game." Therefore, he did try to end points quickly with aggressive groundstrokes. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage states that "Fletcher aimed to preserve his energy, placing greater emphasis on his first serve and seeking opportunities to approach the net for easy volleys." This shows that he did approach the net during the game. Hence (d).

55. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct. The passage states that "Mireles, on the other hand, focused on keeping the ball in play and moving Fletcher around the court, hoping to wear him down and force him into errors." Davis's balanced style might be more effective against Mireles, who relies more on outlasting opponents rather than overpowering them. This, coupled with Mireles' patience and intelligence, may give Davis an edge given that he lacks mental resilience. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that "Fletcher aimed to end points quickly, using his power serves and groundstrokes to control the game." Given that Davis has a balanced game of power and defense, he might be able to withstand Fletcher's power, but Fletcher's mental resilience might be a key advantage. Option (c) is incorrect because, while Davis's balanced style might fare well against both players, his lack of mental resilience is likely to be a significant disadvantage against Fletcher, who has both power and mental resilience. Option (d) is incorrect because we can infer from the passage and the given information about Davis's playing style that he is likely to fare better against Mireles. Hence (b)

56. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct. The passage states that "Fletcher aimed to end points quickly, using his power serves and groundstrokes to control the game." Mia, with her defensive strategies similar to Mireles, could potentially counteract Fletcher's aggressive playstyle, and her mental resilience (similar to Fletcher's) could aid her in enduring the high-pressure points that come with Fletcher's aggressive style. Option (a) is incorrect





because the passage states that "Mireles was famous for his defensive strategies... His patience and intelligence on the court often frustrated opponents into making errors." Since Mia mirrors Gustavo's defensive strategies, it may result in a long drawn-out game with fewer errors. However, the winner would be difficult to predict as they share similar strategies. Option (c) is incorrect because, while Mia's playstyle might challenge both players, her defensive strategies are likely to counteract Fletcher's power-focused approach more effectively. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage provides sufficient information about both Fletcher's and Mireles's strategies to infer Mia's potential performance against them. Hence (b).

57. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct. The passage states that "Mireles was famous for his defensive strategies. He was a counter-puncher, capable of chasing down any ball, returning it with accuracy and poise." Mireles's defensive strategy would likely fare better under conditions that slow down the speed of serves and groundstrokes as it would allow him to extend the rallies and capitalize on his superior agility and stamina. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that "Fletcher aimed to end points quickly, using his power serves and groundstrokes to control the game." If the court conditions slow down the speed of serves and groundstrokes, it would likely reduce the effectiveness of Fletcher's aggressive playstyle. Option (c) is incorrect because the change in court conditions would likely favor Mireles's defensive strategies more than Fletcher's power-oriented game. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage provides sufficient information about both players' styles of play to infer their potential performance under these specific court conditions. Hence (b).

58. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct. The passage states that "Fletcher aimed to preserve his energy, placing greater emphasis on his first serve and seeking opportunities to approach the net for easy volleys." This would suggest that in a doubles team, Fletcher would likely be positioned at the net, playing aggressively. The passage also describes Mireles as a player who "focused on keeping the ball in play and moving Fletcher around the court, hoping to wear him down and force him into errors." Therefore, Mireles would likely be positioned at the baseline, playing defensively. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that "Fletcher aimed to end points quickly, using his power serves and groundstrokes to control the game." Therefore, it would not be in the team's best interest to have Fletcher play defensively. Option (c) is incorrect because, as stated earlier, Fletcher's aggressive style would likely be better utilized at the net, while Mireles's defensive strategies would be more effective at the baseline. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage suggests that Mireles is more of a defensive player, not an aggressive one. Therefore, both players playing at the net with aggressive strategies would not play to Mireles's strengths. Hence (b).

59. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct. the passage states that "Adam Fletcher had mental resilience, a crucial quality that allowed him to endure high-pressure points and produce incredible shots when it mattered the most." This indicates that Adam is accustomed to high-pressure situations and has shown the ability to perform well under such circumstances. Option (b) is incorrect because, while the passage mentions Gustavo's defensive strategies and patience, it does not indicate that he has the same level of mental resilience as Adam when it comes to handling high-pressure situations. Option





(c) is incorrect because, as mentioned earlier, the passage provides stronger evidence of Adam's ability to perform well in high-pressure situations compared to Gustavo. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage provides enough information about the players' respective mental toughness and strategies to infer their potential performance in a high-pressure situation. Hence (a).

60. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct. The passage states that "Mireles was famous for his defensive strategies. He was a counter-puncher, capable of chasing down any ball, returning it with accuracy and poise." Given that Mireles already plays defensively, he would likely be able to adapt his strategy to cope with an opponent with a powerful serve and aggressive groundstrokes. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that "Fletcher aimed to end points quickly, using his power serves and groundstrokes to control the game." It does not mention anything about his adaptability or his ability to change his game plan to suit an opponent's style. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage provides more evidence of Mireles's potential adaptability than Fletcher's. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage provides enough information about the players' respective play styles to infer their potential adaptability against an opponent with a powerful serve and aggressive groundstrokes. Hence (b).

Section A - English

61. Ans. b

Sol: Option (b) is correct. In the context of the passage, when Sir William Beveridge mentions that individuals may "build freely upon" the social insurance, he is referring to the idea that individuals should be able to use the benefits provided by social insurance as a foundation for improving their well-being and quality of life. Hence (b).

62. Ans. a

Sol: Option (a) is correct. the primary purpose of the social assistance is to socially immune the needy who are unable to do so by subscribing themselves to the social security schemes as they lack resources to pay the premiums. It is primarily a welfare activity of the government. Hence (a)

63. Ans. b

Sol: Option (b) is correct. The statement "Participation is compulsory with few exceptions" is an example of antithesis. Antithesis is a rhetorical device where two contrasting or opposing ideas are placed in close proximity to create a contrast and highlight their differences. In this case, the contrast is between "compulsory" and "few exceptions," emphasizing the idea that while participation is generally required, there are limited situations where it is not mandatory. Hence (b).

64. Ans. d

Sol: Option (d) is correct. the statement indicates that the government is strategic in assessing the places where the government funds are to be utilized. Hence (d).

65. Ans. b

Sol: Option (b) is correct. "Gratis" is a Latin word that means "free" or "without charge." In English, it is used to refer to something that is given or provided without any cost or payment. For example, if a service or item is offered "gratis," it means it is being offered for free. In contrast to this, social insurance is given in return of a premium. Hence (b).





Section B - Logical Reasoning

66. Ans. a

Sol: Option (a) is correct. Social insurance involves setting aside money (contributions) to provide compensation against loss in emergencies, much like paying taxes for public services involves contributing to a collective fund to support common needs. Hence (a).

67. Ans. c

Sol: Option (c) is correct. The passage states that social assistance programs are financed from taxation, which means that the primary source of funding is through taxes collected by the government. Hence (c).

68. Ans. b

Sol: Option (b) is correct. According to the passage, in social assistance, a person's other income and resources are taken into account while assessing the need for benefits. Certain resources, like personal savings, may be disregarded, but the benefits are designed to bring a person's total income up to a community-determined maximum. Hence (b).

69. Ans. a

Sol: Option (a) is correct. The assumptions are reasonable, and the conclusion logically follows. If people contribute willingly, and the system is well-managed, then social insurance would effectively provide a safety net. Hence (a).

71. Ans. c

Sol: Option (c) is correct. The most appropriate course of action is to provide tax deductions or credits to individuals who actively contribute to social insurance funds. By offering incentives, such as tax benefits, the government can encourage more people to participate in the social insurance system, ensuring its sustainability and increasing the overall coverage and support for those in need. Options (a) and (b) may create an imbalance and deter participation. Option (d), imposing penalties, may not be as effective as offering positive incentives to promote participation. Hence (c).

72. Ans. b

Sol: Option (b) is correct. The most appropriate course of action is to conduct workshops and seminars to inform people about the benefits of social assistance. This will help raise awareness and ensure that those in need are aware of the available programs and how to access them. Increasing the eligibility criteria (Option (a)) might make it harder for deserving individuals to receive assistance. Reducing funding for social assistance (Option (c)) would be counterproductive in addressing poverty and meeting the needs of the needy. Implementing stricter means testing (Option (d)) could add unnecessary bureaucratic hurdles and may not necessarily increase awareness about the programs. Hence (b).

SECTION A - ENGLISH





73. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because the passage states that "This radical premise was initially met with skepticism by the majority, but it increasingly gained traction over time." This suggests that the author views the Disruptors as a group bringing about a change in thought that is gradually being accepted, indicating a refreshing shift in the city's intellectual climate. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage does not indicate that the author perceives the Disruptors as a threat. There is no language or sentiment expressed that suggests a sense of danger or hostility towards the Disruptors. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage suggests that the author is open to the idea of the Disruptors and their belief, with no explicit statement of disregard or dismissal of their views. Option (d) is incorrect because there is no suggestion in the passage that the author views the Disruptors as a diversion. Rather, the author presents them as an integral part of the city's intellectual landscape.

74. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct because the passage states that "The Disruptors were a minority group, not conforming to the established norms of the Analysts or the Synthesists," which suggests that the Analysts and Synthesists did not agree with the Disruptors' beliefs, making statement (1) true. However, the passage also states that the beliefs of the Empathics, who resided in Emotiva, led to "an intense rivalry between the two cities," suggesting that their beliefs were not embraced by the citizens of Cognito, making statement (2) false. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage does not suggest that both (1) and (2) are true. While the disagreement of the Analysts and Synthesists with the Disruptors is mentioned, there is no indication that the citizens of Cognito embraced the beliefs of the Empathics. Option (c) is incorrect because, according to the passage, the beliefs of the Empathics were not embraced by the citizens of Cognito, thus making (2) false. The disagreement between the Analysts and Synthesists and the Disruptors is clearly mentioned, making (1) true. Option (d) is incorrect because it inaccurately asserts that the citizens of Cognito embraced the beliefs of the Empathics, which contradicts the passage's description of "an intense rivalry between the two cities." Therefore, (2) cannot be inferred from the text. Hence (a).

75. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct because the passage illustrates the city's intellectual life in rich detail and describes it as a place where "the dance of logic and reasoning was neverending, a spectacle that offered a wealth of material for intellectual exploration and understanding." This description reflects a sense of admiration for Cognito's intellectual environment. Option (a) is incorrect because the author does not express any disdain for the logical approach of Cognito. Instead, the passage displays a detailed understanding and acceptance of the city's analytical and synthetic tendencies. Option (b) is incorrect because there is no evidence in the passage that suggests the author's indifference. The author provides a vivid and detailed description of Cognito, indicating active engagement and interest. Option (d) is incorrect because while the passage does acknowledge the contrasting views of the Empathics, there is no sentiment of resentment conveyed. The author objectively narrates the rivalry between the cities, without implying personal bias or resentment. Hence (c).

76. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct because the sentence states that an intellectual in Cognito possesses either analytical prowess or synthetic dexterity, but not both. This implies





that they specialize in one intellectual approach, whether it be analysis or synthesis. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage does not suggest that the Analysts and Synthesists are incapable of understanding each other's views. They may follow different intellectual paths, but there's no indication they can't comprehend each other's perspective. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage does not suggest that inhabitants of Cognito are limited in their cognitive abilities. Rather, they specialize in different areas of cognitive capabilities. Option (d) is incorrect because there's no implication in the passage that the Disruptors are considered intellectually inferior due to their beliefs. The passage states that their belief "increasingly gained traction over time," suggesting that they were gaining acceptance, not deemed inferior. Hence (a).

77. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because the word 'skepticism' is used to describe an attitude of doubt or a disposition to incredulity either in general or toward a particular object. In the passage, this term is used to describe the initial response to the Disruptors' belief. Option (a) is incorrect because the word 'dissecting', as used in the passage, is associated with the Analysts' method of understanding things by breaking them down into smaller parts for examination. It does not mean 'to doubt'. Option (c) is incorrect because 'melody' refers to a sequence of single notes that is musically satisfying. It does not mean 'to doubt'. Option (d) is incorrect because 'prowess' is used in the passage to refer to skill or expertise. It has no connection to the concept of doubt. Hence (b).

SECTION B - LOGICAL REASONING

78. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because according to the passage, every intellectual in Cognito either possesses analytical prowess or synthetic dexterity, but not both. Since the Synthesists are described as possessing synthetic dexterity, it logically follows that they cannot have analytical prowess, which is the defining characteristic of the Analysts. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage clearly states that each individual in Cognito possesses either analytical prowess (which is associated with the Analysts) or synthetic dexterity (which is associated with the Synthesists), but not both. Therefore, it is not possible for all Analysts to also be Synthesists. Option (c) is incorrect because while the passage describes the Disruptors as believing an individual could encompass both analytical prowess and synthetic dexterity, it does not specifically state that every Disruptor possesses both these abilities. The passage suggests that this is their belief, but it doesn't confirm that every Disruptor is both an Analyst and a Synthesist. Option (d) is incorrect because the Empathics are residents of Emotiva, a neighbouring city, not Cognito. There is no information given in the passage that would suggest the Empathics are a mix of Analysts and Synthesists. The Empathics' defining characteristic, according to the passage, is their emotional intelligence and capability for empathy, which is distinct from the attributes of the Analysts and Synthesists. Hence (b).

79. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because it follows directly from the Analysts' axiom. They state that not all objects that shine with a lustrous yellow hue are necessarily gold, which implies that some objects that shine in this way may not be gold. Option (a) is incorrect because, as per the axiom of the Analysts: "If an object is made of gold, it must shine with a lustrous yellow hue. Conversely, not all that shines with a lustrous yellow hue is necessarily gold." This directly contradicts the statement that everything that shines with a lustrous yellow hue is made of gold. Option (c) is incorrect because the axiom of





the Analysts clearly states that if an object is made of gold, it must shine with a lustrous yellow hue. Therefore, an object that does not shine with this hue cannot be gold. Option (d) is incorrect because, while the Analysts' axiom specifies the characteristics of gold, it does not exclude the possibility that other materials might also shine with a lustrous yellow hue. The axiom simply does not provide enough information to confirm this statement. Hence (b).

80. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct because the Disruptors believe that an individual could encompass both analytical prowess (which is associated with the Analysts) and synthetic dexterity (which is associated with the Synthesists). Therefore, from the Disruptors' perspective, it could be possible that some Analysts might also possess synthetic dexterity. Option (b) is incorrect because the Disruptors are described as not conforming to the established norms of the Analysts or the Synthesists. They hold a perspective that an individual could encompass both analytical prowess and synthetic dexterity. This does not suggest that all Disruptors are either Analysts or Synthesists. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage clearly states that the Disruptors are a minority group in Cognito. Therefore, it is not possible that all inhabitants of Cognito are Disruptors. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage states that the Disruptors' perspective challenges the foundational truth of Cognito. However, it does not indicate that they do not believe in it. They merely hold a different interpretation of the foundational truth.

81. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct as it aligns with the Empathics' belief that "not all empathetic beings necessarily possess emotional intelligence." This statement implies that there are empathetic beings who may lack emotional intelligence. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states: "All emotionally intelligent beings are capable of empathy, and yet, not all empathetic beings necessarily possess emotional intelligence." This contradicts the assertion that all empathetic beings are emotionally intelligent. Option (c) is incorrect because the Empathics believe that "All emotionally intelligent beings are capable of empathy," which indicates that emotional intelligence can lead to empathy. However, it does not imply that empathy cannot exist without emotional intelligence. Option (d) is incorrect because the Empathics believe that all emotionally intelligent beings are capable of empathy. This clearly suggests that they value emotional intelligence, as it is seen as a source of empathy.

82. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because the passage states that the Disruptors are a minority group in Cognito that does not conform to the norms of the Analysts or Synthesists. Therefore, it is possible that some Disruptors might not fall into either of these categories. Option (a) is incorrect because, according to the passage, the Disruptors do not conform to the norms of the Analysts or Synthesists. This implies that the Synthesists and Disruptors are distinct groups, contradicting the assertion that all Synthesists are Disruptors. Option (c) is incorrect because there is no information in the passage suggesting that the Empathics, who live in the neighboring city of Emotiva and have different beliefs, could be a subset of the Analysts. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage explicitly mentions that the Disruptors are a minority group in Cognito, implying that not all intellectuals in Cognito are Disruptors.

83. Ans. c





Sol. Option (c) is correct. While the passage doesn't explicitly state this, it's plausible considering that the Disruptors challenge the norms and the Empathics from Emotiva demonstrate that intellectual abilities can coexist with emotional intelligence. Option (a) is incorrect because the foundational truth in Cognito asserts that every intellectual either possesses analytical prowess (associated with the Analysts) or synthetic dexterity (associated with the Synthesists), but not both. The Disruptors challenge this truth but are still a distinct group. Therefore, an individual can't be an Analyst, a Synthesist, and a Disruptor simultaneously. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage clearly states that the Analysts and Synthesists follow the foundational truth of Cognito, which asserts that an individual can either possess analytical prowess or synthetic dexterity, but not both. Thus, it's improbable that the Synthesists believe that all Analysts are capable of synthetic dexterity. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage does not provide any information about the Empathics' beliefs regarding the presence of Disruptors in Emotiva. We cannot make this deduction based on the provided text.

84. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct because it aligns with the foundational truth of Cognito, which states that "Every intellectual individual either possesses analytical prowess or synthetic dexterity." This seems to divide the intellectual sphere into two halves represented by analysts and synthesists. Option (b) is incorrect because, while the passage describes empathy as a significant trait in Emotiva, it does not indicate that the concept of empathy is unknown or alien in Cognito. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage explicitly mentions that the disruptors are a minority group in Cognito. This means that not all intellectually adept individuals in Cognito are disruptors. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage does not make any assertions about the inability of emotional intelligence to coexist with intellectual abilities. In fact, the empathics from Emotiva demonstrate that emotional intelligence can exist alongside intellectual abilities.

Age, occupation, income, educational attainment, and even favorite pastimes were all meticulously recorded. The data, now made publicly available, is being used by various stakeholders, including city officials, local businesses, and social scientists, to better understand the diverse tapestry that makes up Numerico's populace. One of the most intriguing findings from the survey is the age distribution across Numerico's population. Approximately 20% of the residents are under the age of 18, 60% are between the ages of 18 and 60, and the remaining 20% are above the age of 60. When broken down further, it was found that of the citizens above 60, half are over 70 years old. In terms of occupation, 30% of Numerico's residents work in the technology sector, another 30% are employed in healthcare, 20% are in education, 10% are in the arts, and the remaining 10% are spread across other fields. Interestingly, among the residents working in the technology sector, a fifth reported having secondary jobs, mostly in education or the arts.

As for income, the median annual household income in Numerico is \$80,000. However, income distribution varies greatly across different occupational sectors. For instance, those in the technology sector earn a median income of \$120,000 per year, while the





median income for those in the arts is \$40,000 per year. Regarding education, 50% of Numerico's adult population (18 years and above) hold at least a Bachelor's degree. Further, 25% of the population holds a Master's degree, and an impressive 5% hold a Doctoral degree. Interestingly, among the residents with a Doctoral degree, 60% are employed in education, 25% in technology, and the rest in diverse fields. Lastly, the survey recorded the favorite pastimes of Numerico's residents. Reading topped the list, followed by hiking, painting, and coding, revealing an eclectic blend of interests. These findings offer a vibrant snapshot of life in Numerico and present a unique opportunity for a detailed exploration and application of quantitative techniques. With this data in hand, the potential to identify trends, make predictions, and inform decision-making is vast. The city of Numerico is not just a city of numbers but a city of stories told through numbers. As such, it is an ideal playground for those who revel in the beauty and precision of quantitative analysis.

85. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct because the author describes Numerico as "an ideal playground for those who revel in the beauty and precision of quantitative analysis." This indicates a sense of admiration or awe for the city's emphasis on numbers and data in decision-making processes. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage does not indicate any negative feelings towards the city's use of data. Instead, the author's tone suggests fascination and respect for Numerico's approach. Option (c) is incorrect because the author spends a considerable portion of the text describing the survey results, implying a strong interest rather than indifference. Option (d) is incorrect because there's no evidence in the passage that suggests the author envies the educational attainment of Numerico's residents. The mention of residents holding Doctoral degrees is presented as a factual part of the demographic data, not an object of envy.

86. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct because it is a metaphor that describes Numerico as "a city of stories told through numbers." This isn't a literal statement, rather it's a figurative one that equates the city's data analysis with storytelling. Option (b) is incorrect because it is not a metaphor, but a literal statement about Numerico's population size. The word "whopping" is used for emphasis, but it does not create a metaphorical image or comparison. Option (c) is incorrect because it is a statistical fact about the educational attainment in Numerico, and does not use figurative language or imply a comparison, which are key components of a metaphor. Option (d) is incorrect because it is also a statistical fact about the income of residents working in the technology sector in Numerico, and does not involve metaphorical or figurative language.

87. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because the author highlights how various stakeholders use the demographic data to better understand the city's population and informs decision-making. The author also calls Numerico an "ideal playground" for those who appreciate "the beauty and precision of quantitative analysis". Option (a) is incorrect because the passage does not indicate any concerns about privacy. The focus is on the usefulness and application of the collected data, not on potential ethical issues surrounding data collection. Option (c) is incorrect because there is no suggestion in the passage that the author believes the focus on data neglects the human aspect of city governance. In fact, the author refers to the city's demographic data as a "vibrant snapshot of life", indicating





an appreciation for how data can capture the human element. Option (d) is incorrect because the author does not express any doubts about the accuracy or reliability of the demographic data. Rather, the data is described as "meticulously recorded" and "fascinating", implying a high level of trust in its validity.

88. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because immediately following the quoted sentence, the author provides the detailed age distribution of Numerico's population, which exactly matches this option. Option (a) is incorrect because there is no direct correlation made between age and income distribution in the passage. The passage separately discusses age distribution and income, but doesn't establish a relationship between the two. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage does not specify the employment sectors for residents above the age of 60. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage does not specify the favorite pastimes according to age groups. It generally states that reading, hiking, painting, and coding are popular pastimes among the residents, without relating them to a specific age group.

89. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct because the author emphasizes the importance of Numerico's analytical approach to city planning, resource allocation, and social services. It is suggested that this data-driven method forms a significant part of the experience of living in Numerico. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage doesn't mention anything about the city's cultural heritage or historical landmarks. Option (b) is incorrect because, although the city uses a data-driven approach, the passage doesn't indicate that residents are actively involved in the decision-making processes. Option (d) is incorrect because the author does not mention any details about the city's nightlife or food scene in the passage.

SECTION B - LOGICAL REASONING

90. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct because the passage states that 20% of Numerico's residents are over 60 years old, and of these, half are over 70. Therefore, the number of residents over 70 is 0.5 * 0.2 * 1,000,000 = 100,000. Option B is incorrect because, according to the passage, 10% of Numerico's residents work in the arts sector. Therefore, the number of residents working in the arts sector is 0.1 * 1,000,000 = 100,000, not 50,000. Option C is incorrect because the passage mentions that 50% of Numerico's adult population holds at least a Bachelor's degree. Given that 60% of the population are adults (aged 18-60), the percentage of individuals with a Bachelor's degree is 0.5 * 0.6 * 1,000,000 = 300,000, which is higher than the 30% of the population (300,000 individuals) employed in the healthcare sector. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage reveals that the median income for those in the technology sector is \$120,000 per year, while the median household income in Numerico is \$80,000. Although the income in the technology sector is higher, it's not twice the median household income. Hence (a).

91. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because, as explained above, the calculation leads to 60,000 individuals who work in the technology sector and also have secondary jobs. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that 30% of Numerico's residents work in the technology sector, and of those, a fifth have secondary jobs. Therefore, the estimated number of residents in the technology sector with secondary jobs is 0.2 * 0.3 * 1,000,000





= 60,000, not 30,000. Option (c) is incorrect because it underestimates the number of residents in the technology sector who have secondary jobs, which as per the passage and the calculations, is 60,000, not 20,000. Option (d) is incorrect as it significantly underestimates the actual number. As per the passage and the calculations, the correct number is 60,000, not 15,000. Hence (b).

92. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct because the passage mentions that 5% of Numerico's adult population holds a Doctoral degree, and 60% of these individuals are employed in education. Therefore, the number of residents with a Doctoral degree who are working in the education sector is 0.05 * 0.6 * 1,000,000 = 30000. Option (b) is incorrect because the calculated number of residents with a Doctoral degree in the education sector is 30,000, not 15,000. Option (c) is incorrect because the correct calculation yields a number of 30,000 residents, not 25,000. Option (d) is incorrect as well because the calculated number of residents with a Doctoral degree in the education sector is 30,000, not 20,000. Hence (a).

93. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct because, as explained above, the calculation leads to 400,000 individuals who are adults but do not hold a Bachelor's degree. Rest of the options are incorrect because the passage states that 80% of Numerico's population are adults, and of these, 50% hold at least a Bachelor's degree. This implies that 50% or less than 50% of the adults do not have a Bachelor's degree. Therefore, the number of adult residents without a Bachelor's degree is $0.5 * 0.8 * 1,000,000 \le 400,000$. Hence (c).

94. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct because, as explained above, the calculation leads to an estimated 200,000 individuals who are under the age of 18 in Numerico. Hence, (a).

95. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct because the passage states that 80% of Numerico's population are adults, and of these, 30% are employed in the technology sector. Therefore, the number of adults employed in the technology sector is 0.3 * 0.8 * 1,000,000 = 240,000. Hence (a).

96. Ans. d

Sol. Option (d) is correct because, as explained above, the calculation leads to an estimated 70% of adults in Numerico who are not employed in the technology sector that means 0.8*0.7*1000000 = 560000. Required percent over total population is 56%. Hence (d).

SECTION A - ENGLISH

97. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct because the Festival of Badges is described as an event of joy, unity, and appreciation, where each class showcases their skills and contributions, thereby promoting unity among the different classes. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage clearly states that during the Festival of Badges, not only the Sages but also the Creators and the Observers get a chance to showcase their skills and contributions to the city. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage specifies that the badges worn by each class cannot be transferred from one person to another, implying that they cannot





be switched even temporarily. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage does not mention that the city council makes decisions about class changes during the Festival of Badges. It is mentioned that such decisions are made, but not specifically during the festival.

98. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct because it accurately captures the essence of the sentence, stating that the unity among diverse social classes forms the backbone of Veritoria's society, setting it apart from other cities. Option (a) is incorrect because while the passage does mention that Veritoria has unique features (like its social structure and cultural practices), the last sentence does not refer to its architecture specifically. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage portrays a picture of harmony and balance, rather than chaos, within Veritoria's diverse social structure. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage explicitly states that Veritorians are born into their classes and cannot change their class throughout their life, with very rare exceptions.

99. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct because the passage mentions that the change of class for an individual can occur only under rare circumstances and with the unanimous agreement of the city council. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage clearly states that Veritorians cannot change their social class throughout their life, except in rare circumstances where they display remarkable aptitude for another class. Option (b) is incorrect because according to the passage, Veritorians inherit the class of their parents, which means the children of a Creator will also be a Creator. Option (d) is incorrect because the social class system in Veritoria is clearly stated to be hereditary; individuals inherit the class of their parents.

100. Ans. d

Sol. Option (d) is correct because it explicitly mentions the Sages' role in devising laws and policies, suggesting they play a significant role in policymaking in Veritoria. Option (a) is incorrect because it refers to the role of the Sages in education and enlightenment but does not directly suggest their role in policymaking. Option (b) is incorrect because this sentence refers to the Creators, not the Sages, and their role in technological advancement and culture. Option (c) is incorrect as it simply refers to the badge of the Sages and does not shed light on their role in policymaking.

101. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because the passage implies that the badges are not merely ornamental but represent the unique roles and rights of each class within Veritoria's society. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage does not suggest that the badges are a source of income for the Veritorians. They are a symbol of class and hold the power accorded to each class. Option (c) is incorrect because, according to the passage, Veritorians cannot freely choose or change their badges; they are born into their class and inherit the corresponding badge. Option (d) is incorrect because, while the badges differentiate the classes, they are not mentioned as a symbol of competition. They represent the unity in diversity that Veritorians value.

Sol. Option (d) is correct because the passage states that "These badges are not merely ornamental but hold the power and rights accorded to each social class." This suggests that the badges act as a tangible representation of the authority and privileges of each social class in Veritoria. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that "Each social class has a distinguishing badge they wear: the Sages wear a badge with an owl, the Creators carry a badge with a hammer and a brush, and the Observers have an eye on their badge." This suggests that the badges are unique to each class and are not interchangeable. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage specifies that "The badges are always worn and cannot be transferred from one person to another." Thus, the badges are personal to the wearer and cannot be transferred, even within the same social class. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage mentions that "These badges are not merely ornamental but hold the power and rights accorded to each social class." Therefore, the badges are not only symbolic but also represent the authority and privileges of the respective social classes.

103. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct because the passage states that "All Veritorians are born into their classes. They follow a strict societal structure where they cannot change their class throughout their life. They inherit the class of their parents, and this practice has been followed for generations. However, there are exceptions." This clearly states that the social class of a Veritorian is typically inherited from their parents, with the possibility of exceptions. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that "They follow a strict societal structure where they cannot change their class throughout their life." This means that individuals in Veritoria cannot switch their classes freely. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage specifies that "If a Sage demonstrates a remarkable aptitude for creating or an Observer shows wisdom and knowledge, they can be granted the badge of the respective class. But these cases are rare and only occur under the unanimous agreement of the city council". This suggests that even if an individual exhibits the qualities of another class, the change in class only happens with the agreement of the city council. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage explains the existence of three distinct social classes: Sages, Creators, and Observers. Therefore, not all inhabitants of Veritoria belong to the same social class.

104. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because the passage states that "The city of Veritoria is located in the valley of the Lumerian Mountains. The mountains act as a natural barrier, protecting the city from outer threats. Because of the city's location, the Veritorians have developed an efficient agricultural system." This clearly indicates that the geographical location of the city provides protection and supports effective agriculture. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that "Because of the city's location, the Veritorians have developed an efficient agricultural system." This implies that the city's location in the Lumerian Mountains does not hinder but actually aids in its agricultural activities. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage mentions that Veritorians "grow a variety of crops", contradicting the assertion that they are unable to produce any significant crops due to their location. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage specifically identifies that "their primary crop is grapes, from which they produce an exceptional wine," not wheat.

105. Ans. c





Sol. Option (c) is correct because the passage clearly mentions that "Every year, they celebrate the Festival of Badges, where each class showcases their skills and contributions to the city." Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that "During this festival, the Sages share their wisdom and knowledge through speeches and lectures. The Creators display their creations, from intricate artworks to impressive inventions. The Observers, usually silent, take the stage to report the progress of the city and any concerns that need to be addressed." This shows that all three social classes actively participate in the festival, including the Observers. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage describes the Festival of Badges as an "event of joy, unity, and appreciation." It doesn't mention it as a time for presenting issues or grievances. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage doesn't provide information on the frequency of the Festival of Badges other than it being celebrated "every year." Thus, it doesn't support the assertion that the festival is biannual.

106. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because the Observers report on the city's progress during the Festival of Badges. If the Festival is not being held, then it follows from the provided premises that the Observers will not report on the city's progress this year. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that the Observers report on the city's progress during the Festival of Badges. Since the Festival of Badges is not being held this year, it cannot be concluded that the Observers will report on the city's progress this year. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage does not provide information about the Observers participating in other city events outside the Festival of Badges. Hence, it cannot be assumed they will participate in other events. Option (d) is incorrect because Option (b) is correct, thereby contradicting the assertion that none of the statements are true.

107. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because if a majority of Veritorians are both Creators and Sages and no Sage who isn't a Creator is an Observer who isn't a Creator, it implies that there is some overlap between Sages and Observers (those who are Creators). Option (a) is incorrect because the premises do not provide sufficient information to definitively conclude that no Sages can be Observers. Option (c) is incorrect because the premises do not provide sufficient information to conclusively state that all Sages are Observers. Option (d) is incorrect because, based on the provided assumptions, we can determine that some Sages are Observers, so the answer can indeed be determined.

108. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct because, based on the premises, some Creators are Observers, and since both Creators and Observers are Veritorians, it follows that some Veritorians are both Observers and Creators. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage does not suggest that all Veritorians are Observers. There are other classes of Veritorians mentioned, such as Creators and Sages. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage does not suggest that all Veritorians are Creators. Just as in Option (a), there are other classes of Veritorians, such as Observers and Sages. Option (d) is incorrect because Option (c) is correct, which contradicts the assertion that none of the statements are true.

109. Ans. d

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Sol. Option (d) is correct. The first sentence considers 'Zephyrs to be the pillars '. Second sentence considers 'Lake Aquilia being a mirror' and the third sentence states' The Vernal language being a bridge'. Hence all three are metaphors.

110. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct because the entire passage details the various traditions, beliefs, and practices of Verbonia, emphasizing the profound beliefs of its people. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that the interplay of beliefs, practices, and traditions makes Verbonia captivating, and there's no indication that these are "tightly guarded" or that Verbonia remains an enigma. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage doesn't contrast tradition with reality. Instead, it suggests that residents live their lives deeply intertwined with their lore. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage does not mention outsiders trying to unravel Verbonia's mysteries. It focuses on the city's beliefs and practices.

111. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct because the passage mentions that the Celestite gemstone is believed to have properties that enhance the abilities of its possessor. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage doesn't directly associate Celestite with wealth. Option (b) is incorrect because, while there's a mention of homes having windows facing north for direction, there's no direct association between Celestite and direction. Option (d) is incorrect because, although the Vernal language is associated with communication through the alignment of stars, there's no connection mentioned between Celestite and communication.

112. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because "enchanting" is synonymous with "captivating," implying that something is so interesting or beautiful that it holds your attention. Option (a) is incorrect because "boring" is the opposite of "captivating." Option (c) is incorrect because "commonplace" means ordinary or not special, which does not fit the context. Option (d) is incorrect because "repulsive" is also the opposite of "captivating."

113. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct because it highlights the unique and mystical nature of Verbonia, setting the stage for the detailed exploration of its beliefs and practices. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage emphasizes the uniqueness and profound beliefs of Verbonia, not its size or comparison to a generic "charm." Option (c) is incorrect because while it hints at Verbonia having stories, it erroneously compares Verbonia to large, well-known cities like Rome and Paris. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage does not focus on shopping practices or a contrast between modernity and antiquity in that context.

SECTION B - LOGICAL REASONING

114. Ans. a

Sol. Option (a) is correct because the passage states that "any taint in the lake's water is viewed with alarm as an indication that deceit and treachery are on the rise." Option (b) is incorrect because the passage does not make any correlation between the tainting of Lake Aquilia and external threats to the city. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage states that if a Zephyr tree withers, it impacts the lifespan of the city and not the purity of the lake. They are two separate beliefs. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage





states the importance and reverence of Celestite in trade but does not link it to the purity or tainting of Lake Aquilia.

115. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct because the passage states that "if it floats, it signifies acceptance and understanding of that emotion or thought," indicating that the individual has come to terms with it. Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that every resident crafts an artifact representing their most profound thought or emotion of the year, suggesting that each artifact is crafted with significant thought. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage mentions that possessing a flawed Celestite can bring misfortune, but it does not correlate this belief with the practices of the Gala of Shadows or the floating/sinking of artifacts. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage does mention the Lumas stars and their significance, but there is no direct connection between them and the crafting of artifacts for the Gala of Shadows.

116. Ans. d

Sol. Option (d) is correct because the passage states that "Every resident believes that if a Zephyr tree withers, a year is taken away from the life of Verbonia." Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that the North Star is a guiding force and is associated with homes having a window facing north. It does not connect the North Star to the Zephyr trees directly. Option (b) is incorrect because the passage mentions the importance of flawless Celestite bringing success, but it does not link flawed Celestite to the Zephyr trees. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage does not make a direct correlation between the withering of a Zephyr tree and the trade prospects of the city.

117. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because the passage explicitly states that "The alignment of Lumas, Spectras, and Umbros determines the tone, mood, and essence of the messages communicated." Option (a) is incorrect because the passage states that Vernal "is predominantly based on the alignment of the stars." Although it mentions Lumas, Spectras, and Umbros, it does not state that the language is based solely on Lumas. Option (c) is incorrect because, while the passage mentions that Spectras are often seen during dusk, it does not imply that Vernal messages are exclusively communicated at this time. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage states that Umbros "are faint but are essential as they represent wisdom," meaning they do play a role in the Vernal language.

118. Ans. c

Sol. Option (c) is correct because the passage explicitly states that "Homes without a northern window are thought to be directionless and lacking in purpose." Option (a) is incorrect because the passage does not establish any connection between the presence of a northern window and the quality of Celestite. Option (b) is incorrect because, while the passage mentions the significance of Lake Aquilia, it does not state that homes with windows facing north have a direct view of it. Option (d) is incorrect because the Gala of Shadows is an event where every resident crafts an artifact, and the passage does not specify any home-based criteria, like the presence of a northern window, for participation.





Sol. Option (b) is correct because the passage states that "it's said that possessing a flawed Celestite can bring misfortune, whereas a perfect gem can bring unprecedented success." Option (a) is incorrect because while the passage does discuss the reduction in lifespan in connection with the withering of Zephyr trees, it does not link this belief to flawed Celestite. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage does not establish any connection between the quality or presence of Celestite and the purity of Lake Aquilia. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage clearly mentions that Verbonia thrives on the export of Celestite and that it is treated with great reverence, indicating its significance beyond mere ornamental purposes.

120. Ans. b

Sol. Option (b) is correct because the passage explicitly states that during the Gala, "Every resident crafts an artifact representing their most profound thought or emotion of the year," signifying its role as a reflective event that marks the end of the year. Option (a) is incorrect because, while the passage does mention the importance of Celestite gems, it does not state that they are traded during the Gala of Shadows. Option (c) is incorrect because the passage does not establish a direct connection between the Gala of Shadows and the purification of Lake Aquilia. Option (d) is incorrect because the passage describes the language Vernal as being influenced by the alignment of stars, but it does not suggest that the Gala of Shadows' purpose is to predict future star alignments.
